Life Membership – The highest Club honour has been bestowed on only 35 members in the Club's 89 years of service.

LIFE MEMBERSHIP – KRISTIE ORCHARD

Kristie joined Swanbourne Nedlands Surf Life Saving Club during the 1993/1994 season, transferring from the City of Bunbury Surf Life Saving Club. At the time, Swanny had just over 150 members and only 12 senior female members. The Club was struggling to fulfill its patrol requirements until Kristie, and other women joined.

Kristie was a member for five years until she temporarily left the Club to travel. In her first five years she was active across Lifesaving, Education, and Surf Sports as well as Social. She held several positions during this time – Gear Steward (now known as Craft Officer), Patrol Officer, Patrol Captain and three seasons as First Aid Officer.

Kristie wasted no time in gaining Education awards, completing her First Aid Certificate and Advanced Resuscitation Certificate. She also gained her Training Officers Certificate by supporting Surf Rescue Certificate and Bronze Medallion courses.

In 1995 the existing patrol tower was constructed, and Kristie used her nursing expertise to outfit and stock the first aid room. Note that this was during a time when there were no doctors in the Club and very few working in the medical industry.

In Surf Sports, Kristie was a regular at Points Races and Cup events, winning the Oldham Memorial Cup on one occasion. She also represented the club at SLSWA carnivals in boards, surf race, ski, flags, sprints, first aid and march past. In 1998 she teamed up with Jane Leaversuch to win a bronze in the Open First Aid State Championships.

In 1998 Kristie left Swanny to travel, but she maintained her involvement with Surf, patrolling and competing for Henley (South Australia), Darwin, Freshwater (NSW) and Broome. While at these clubs Kristie continued to contribute as an active patrolling member, competitor, and committee member.

Kristie met her husband Tom through surf lifesaving, while a member at Henley SLSC. Luckily for Swanny, Kristie moved back to Perth with Tom and their three children – Hannah, Alice and Patrick, and re-joined the club in 2010/2011. Kristie resumed patrolling and in 2011/12 was awarded her 5 Year Service Award (a little late) followed by her 10 Year Service Award in 2014/2015.

It is this second stint at Swanny where Kristie has created a legacy for the Club. Kristie stepped into an Age Group Manager position and three years later, also the role of Junior Development Manager, overseeing our younger lifesavers, the Under 6s through to Under 19s. She held this Management Committee position for four years and for much of this time Kristie ran both the Nipper and Youth programs, responsible for up to 200 Junior members each season.

Nipper and Youth programs blossomed under Kristie's guidance, with her never ending energy further growing Nipper numbers and reinvigorating SRC courses and Sunday Youth activities. Her efforts were recognised when she was awarded the Simon Davies Best Clubperson Award in 2019.

After four years as Junior Development Manager, Kristie turned her attention to focus specifically on our Youth members, the Under 14s to Under 19s. She held the position of Youth Officer in 2019/2020 then moved across portfolios into the new position of Junior Education Officer the following season, a position Kristie still holds today.

Her nine years of consecutive involvement in the Development portfolio, as Age Group Manager, Junior Development Manager, Youth Officer and Junior Education Officer has forever changed our Youth programs and given them more prominence within the Club. She always goes above and beyond to deliver well structured, organised, inclusive and most of all fun, sessions every week.

As Youth and Junior Education Officer, Kristie has put forward candidates with outstanding skills and knowledge for SRC exams, encouraged participation in Club and State surf sports, provided development opportunities through SLSWA leadership camps and enabled our Youth members to make strong connections with senior members across all areas of the Club. This has given our Youth the self-assurance to get involved and set them up as confident and capable future leaders of Swanny.

Kristie's other strength, and love, is surf sports. Kristie has always been a true all-round athlete – competing in boards, skis, swim, sprints, flags, long run, iron, surf boats and lifesaving.

Kristie is the Club's second most decorated Masters competitor with a staggering 35 State medals across all disciplines, including eight gold plus an Aussies Bronze in the 140+ Female Beach Relay. She continues to be a strong competitor; just this season winning the 40+ Overall Champion at the Club Championships as well as multiple medals at SLSWA Masters Championships events.

Always ready to pull on the red and white cap to make up a team or compete individually, she was a key player in reinvigorating surf boats four years ago and still manages to balance early morning training with a busy family life and night shifts at work.

Kristie has always excelled in the social arena too. She loves a dress up, and is always dressed appropriately, or inappropriately, depending on the party theme. The first to arrive, the last to leave and the one to party hardest in between, Kristie has featured in everything from Annual Dinners, Blue Parties, President Cocktail Parties and anything else on the social calendar.

Much of Kristie's contribution to Swanny won't be found searching through Annual Reports or official records. In her 17 years of dedicated and unwavering service she has never done anything by half and is constantly making improvements around the Club that often go unnoticed except for those lucky enough to directly benefit.

The Nipper boards will be repaired, reordered, and returned to their correct storage positions. The orange vests washed and bundled in sizes. She sewed the previous Nipper age group flags herself. She wears a tie

and glasses to deliver an SRC quiz and sends them on scavenger hunts to get familiar with the club rooms. She drives car loads of Youth members to carnivals, running between the boat arena and water and craft arenas to cheer them on.

She brings craft supplies to Albany to make sure her boat crew is best dressed and gifts matching socks and jewellery. She steps far out of her technological comfort zone to make sure Youth members in COVID isolation can still join the end of season party. She's the first to offer to tow the boat and will prepare and collect it the night before to make sure it's ready for an early start. She has even been seen weeding the top courtyard!

Without Kristie and her never ending enthusiasm and dedication, Swanny would not be the Club it is now, she is everything that the Swanny spirit represents.

For her service, the Club is proud to award Kristie Orchard Life Membership to the Swanbourne-Nedlands Surf Life Saving Club.

It's an absolute pleasure to hear our Youth members speak about Swanny with such passion and confidence, and to see their skills and interests flourish. They are the future leaders of the Club, and that bright future is already here!

Cygnet IX and Cygnet X were welcomed into the Swanny Surf Boat Fleet, followed by an exhibition row by our Headless Oarsmen crew who managed to crack a couple of good waves.

SECOND PLACE - SLSWA CLUB OF THE YEAR 2021

Swanny is sometimes overshadowed by our bigger, better-resourced cousins on the coast. Even so, the passion, energy and inclusiveness that make Swanny a truly unique and amazing community saw us take out second place in the Lavan Club of the Year category at the 2021 SLSWA Awards of Excellence. It was an honour to attend the presentation in the Crown Ballroom and accept the award on behalf of our Club and its members. What makes this an even more significant achievement is that the winner of the State award (Trigg Island) went on to take out the national prize, meaning we came incredibly close to winning Club of the Year against the best in the country. This is something all our members can be proud of.

NIPPER PROGRAM PARTNERSHIP

This season some members called into question Woodside’s sponsorship of the SLSWA Nipper Program, citing the sponsorship as incompatible with the Club’s Objective ‘*To encourage the physical and social welfare of Members*’ on environmental grounds. These concerns were brought to the attention of the Club’s Management Committee.

The Club Objectives and Strategic Plan focus on delivering surf life saving services to Swanbourne Beach and servicing the four pillars of Surf. The Management Committee resolved that access to the benefits associated with the Woodside Nippers partnership have positively enhanced our Club’s development activities in line with our Objectives and Strategic Plan. The Club has an agreement with SLSWA to uphold the Woodside Nipper partnership and is currently committed to this.

The Club has a Health, Safety & Environment Officer to ensure sustainability initiatives are considered at a Club level. I can only see Club contributions to sustainability initiatives increasing in number and value into the future.

CLUB LEASE & ANNUAL GRANT

At the very beginning of this season, I was pleased to sign a Deed of Variation to the Club Lease which ensures funding is provided to the Club in recognition of our lifesaving service every year until our lease expires in 2034, to the value of approximately \$800k over the next 12 years. The work for this variation was largely completed in the previous season by Mark Grzanka, Tim Tucak and I.

This season we were able to rectify another issue with the Club’s lease, that the Patrol Tower was not included in our agreement. We worked closely with the City of Nedlands to include the Patrol Tower in our

leased area, removing any ambiguity around maintenance responsibilities and insurances coverage relating to this space.

COVID-19

The previous two seasons at Swanny were somewhat affected by COVID, with restricted patrolling at the end of 2019 and the cancelation of events in 2020. However, it was this season as the pandemic truly reached our isolated West Coast that the Club and our members were more significantly impacted by COVID and associated restrictions put in place by the WA Government and in some cases the Club itself.

I can say that this was one of the more challenging topics the Management Committee has had to navigate.

For historical perspective, from 31 January 2022 the WA Government required anyone accessing a gym facility to be fully vaccinated against COVID-19, and at this time the Club gym was not separated from the changerooms, so the same requirements applied to this space also. As licensed venues, the Rampant Swan and Courtyard, also required proof of vaccination (while food or drink was being served). The WA Government also instigated Critical Business Worker restrictions requiring vaccination which impacted some of our Members (predominantly those using the Clubrooms regularly). In addition to the WA Government requirements, SLSWA issued guidelines that "Taking into consideration a SLSWA affiliated Club's duty to provide a safe working environment for its Volunteers, SLSWA recommends that Clubs develop and implement a policy that in order to undertake Volunteer Duties, all Volunteers must be Fully Vaccinated".

The advice given by our State body was challenging as they provided guidelines, not policy. There was no reporting on compliance or uptake of individual affiliated Clubs approaches, leaving a somewhat fragmented response up and down the coast. This ultimately absorbed immense Club resources deciding on our own approach as well as independently reaching out to other Clubs for a baseline.

The Management Committee communicated to the Club in late January 2022 a request for vaccination status from all volunteer members and requirement for full vaccination of patrolling members over 16. This was augmented later in the patrol season with the requirement for mask wearing by members while on patrol to minimise exposure and risk to our members and help ensure that the Club would continue to be able to meet our lifesaving obligations.

COVID-19 brought complex and emotive issues to Swanny. I can say that decisions made by the Management Committee in relation to COVID-19 were rigorously debated over many hours and much correspondence, with the health and safety of our members always our priority.

BUILDING EXTENSION

I can be quoted in last season's annual report saying, 'I am confident that the Club's building redevelopment will go ahead, likely breaking ground in March 2022'. Unfortunately, this has not been the case.

My confidence in the development was based on the tremendous amount of funding we had secured from our building partners (Federal Government, WA Government via CSRFF, Lotterywest, City of Nedlands and SNSLSC) to the final sum of ~\$2.1million after the City of Nedlands came on board in June 2021.

Toilet blockage cleared

Relieved Swanbourne-Nedlands Surf Lifesaving Club volunteers will wave in an era of modern women's toilets after getting the final funds for a \$2.2 million upgrade.

The plight of about 350 female club members included sharing one toilet, four "prison-style" gang showers and being seen from the outside if a shower door was opened.

They will now get a shower and toilet block four times the size of their current 1950s-era facilities.

"There will be many happy female members who have never had fit for purpose changeroom facilities at Swanny," club vice-president Kate Hutchinson said.

"This upgrade is long overdue and it will be great

Yet again the project has come under siege from the COVID-19 pandemic, the pandemic that robbed the Club of funding in 2020 when many grants were diverted to pandemic related projects. This season, State and Federal pandemic stimulus packages, material shortages due to shipping and production issues, and labour shortages due to travel restrictions combined to increase the cost of construction in WA to unprecedented levels with rises anywhere between 30% and 40%.

Although the future of the Club's building project is again reliant on sourcing additional funding, an incredible amount of positive progress has been made throughout the year.

In June 2021, along with securing \$248,000 in funding from the City of Nedlands for the project (to be provided over 2 two financial years in equal parts (2021/2022 and 2022/2023), the City also agreed to take on the project management of the Club building from the tender stage. This was an excellent result from the Club's perspective and for the project budget. Having a project manager inside the City administration has seen the City become far more proactive in advocating for the project.

In addition to the City of Nedlands taking on a project management role, the Club also transferred funding acquittal responsibility for the Federal and State Government grant to the City. The City has more resources and is better equipped to correctly communicate with the funding bodies and acquit the grants, this also takes a huge workload and responsibility off Club volunteers. Lotterywest is the only funding partner that is still engaged directly to the Club as they would not transfer this responsibility to the City.

Before we were able to hand the project over to the City, the Club had to complete the tender documentation set. When I say the Club, I really mean Daniel Juengling. What seemed like a fairly straight forward task (from a naïve President's perspective) turned into an incredibly complex 10-month long process which saw Dan contribute an absolutely mammoth quantity of time and professional architectural skills. I have not seen a contribution as significant as Dan's from a non-committee member in my time at the Club. His commitment to the project is even more noteworthy given Dan is no longer a patrolling member and has well and truly done his time as an ex-President and Long Service member.

The Club development is classified as a Class 9 public building which requires extremely robust fire, mechanical, access, hydraulic and energy certifications (amongst other requirements). In light of this, Dan worked with 11 technical sub-consultants to document the project in detail for tender. This included potentially project-stopping challenges brought by DFES fire requirements on which Dan worked with the hydraulic consultant, City of Nedlands and DFES to land on an acceptable performance solution. Dan regularly attended multiple meetings each week with the various subconsultants to ensure works were being progressed. Dan worked side by side with a draftsman to consolidate the documentation and tender package containing more than 500 pages of information.

The tender package was completed in February 2022 and the City of Nedlands released the tender publicly on Saturday 26th February. On Tuesday 8th February, representatives from seven different builders attended the compulsory pre-tender briefing. We received three submissions, which the City are still reviewing with the average of the price in the mid \$2millions. This price tag fits the adjusted expectations for this type of construction market, where there is a very high demand for trades and construction teams. We expected a 40% increase from initial preliminary pricing that was put together in 2020. The tendered prices are about 35% higher than the original estimate.

At this time, the City and I have been working with the funding partners to prepare for upward funding variation requests. All parties have signalled they are in favour of increasing their contributions to meet the funding shortfall if all parties contribute. This poses some challenges with the Lotterywest grant variation process taking months to complete and the Federal Government currently in caretaker mode due to the 2022 Federal Election.

We will continue to work towards the much-needed Club Building Development and haven't lost sight of its importance. The Club is completely out of storage for surf and rescue craft, there is no universal access to changerooms, our showers are all open and there is still only one female toilet for over 300 female members. This must be rectified.

Wrapping up, I will be taking a break from the Management Committee. While I would have liked to see the Club building extension completed while performing the Club President role, it has become clear that the project may drag on longer than anticipated. Ultimately the dual role of leading the biggest project the Club has attempted to undertake in recent times, as well as performing the role of President has become too much of a commitment for me to maintain.

The good news is, while I will not be nominating for the position of President in the Club's 90th season, I will continue to drive and support the building project in a different capacity.

Being the President of Swanny has been a humbling experience and incredible opportunity. There aren't many places that allow you to learn on the job and hone your skills in the way I have been able to over the last three years.

I couldn't have anticipated all that would eventuate in the role as President of this large volunteer incorporated association when I took it on in 2019. I want to highlight some of the opportunities the role has afforded me: chairing a board, enacting two sets of constitution changes, fostering a 40% increase in membership, overhauling the Clubs strategic plan, refurbishing the patrol tower, resolving the Club's laneway access dispute, engaging Club patrons and leveraging their support, working with politicians and their teams, speaking at Council more than a dozen times, being interviewed and quoted in newspapers, getting 'into it' with the ex-Minister for Sport and Recreation on 6PR, having to lead and adapt through COVID-19 times, managing a multi-million dollar building project from funding to tender stage, negotiating with Council to secure long term annual grant funding, having the patrol tower recognised in our lease, writing cohesive (and sometimes successful) grant proposals, and supporting a Management Committee with more than 50 volunteer officer roles. An extensive list we have achieved as a Club!

It's been a privilege, thanks Swanny.

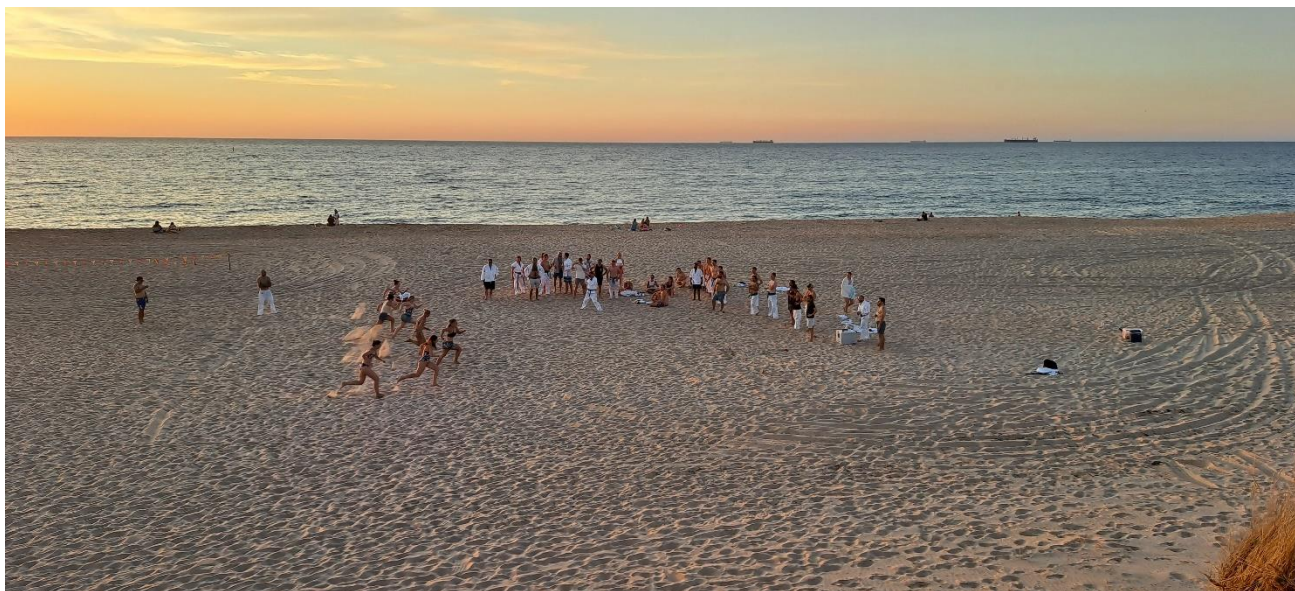

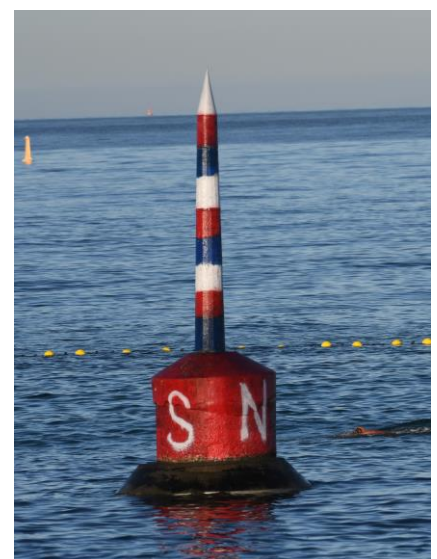

What a season it has been. With regular beach closures due to sharks and several members trying to outdo each other in the injury department, patrols had their hands full. One pleasant surprise this season was the lack of stingers, what a treat!

Tessa Van Der Laan closed the show, after stepping up to Vice Captain in only her second season. Tessa led a mixed patrol of volunteers for the final patrol of the year on Easter Monday, when a five metre great white shark was spotted 20 metres off Nudies. Tessa did a fantastic job to evacuate the beach and notify the public with only a handful of members on patrol. Apparently, President Luke Bishop had the unenviable task of escorting a couple of slow swimmers into shore!

The efforts of those who continue to volunteer extraordinary amounts of time to keep Swanny Education as the benchmark on the West Coast is astounding.

This year has seen no downtime in the Education space. It started with six eager Swans battling the winter surf to attain their IRB Drivers, through to an IRB Crew course stretching on beyond the patrol season and so, so much in between.

Education at Swanny never sleeps with a (conservative) estimate of more than 1,500 volunteer hours provided to deliver high quality training to members and extending a warm welcome to neighbouring clubs who do not have the same capacity as Swanny to deliver commercial and SLSWA award training. The achievements of the Education team this year include facilitation of courses in:

- IRB Crew

- PWC (Jet ski) in conjunction with City Beach
- Senior First Aid – HLTAID011 (Nationally Accredited)
- Silver Medallion - Beach Management
- Silver Medallion - IRB Driver
- SLSWA Trainers Course
- Surf Rescue Certificate

In addition to providing opportunities for new awards to be attained, the Education team facilitated annual proficiency for all awards (Bronze Medallion, Advanced Resuscitation Techniques, IRB Driver, IRB Crew). Our team of ever reliable Assessors also provided course assessments for both Swanny and neighbouring clubs.

None of this would be possible without the hard work and dedication of those who have taken on the responsibility of a leadership role within the Education portfolio.

Bronze Medallion Officer, Peran Bishop – Peran has gallantly filled this role for the past three seasons and continues to provide an engaging, supportive, and fun learning environment at every Bronze Medallion course. This involves not only assisting our Bronzies, but wrangling trainers, happy helpers, water safety and assessors. Peran is the first to arrive and the last to leave (does he actually leave?) and is always available for the Bronzies.

Junior Education Officer, Kristie Orchard – Kristie is a tireless contributor to Junior Education at Swanny and will always get what needs to be done, done with no fuss. IMPROVING THE SWANNY EDUCATION EXPERIENCE

The season did not pass by without its hurdles and challenges. Be it the eleventh-hour emails, messages and phone calls to secure assessors, incidents or injuries during training courses, award processing delays in Surfguard, or the need to turn to the same people time and time again. The season end provides an opportunity to reflect on how we can improve, prevent, or manage these hurdles and a large amount of work has occurred to improve the Swanny education experience. Positive initiatives implemented in 2021/2022 included:

- Increasing the number of trainers / assessors / facilitators, in particular those able to deliver higher awards courses in Advanced Resuscitation Techniques, Pain Management and Silver Medallion Beach Management
- Establishing relationships with neighbouring clubs to access training in awards not provided by Swanny – primarily PWC. Building education in this area will in time increase our lifesaving capacity and our ability to host major events or support community events such as Abalone Patrols.
- Development of Trainer and Assessor education pathways with a dedicated support for those who wish to become a Swanny Trainer, Assessor or Facilitator.
- Establishment of an Education Manager's forum with neighbouring clubs (Coogee, Fremantle, Cottesloe and North Cottesloe) to build an education network to provide increased opportunities for training as well as processes for sharing resources to support club education activities.

This work and further progression of these initiatives will continue next season to ensure Education at Swanny remains the benchmark. It is every member of the Club that makes Education great. Whether it's those hunched over at the finish line of their only Run Swim Run of the year when completing proficiency, those completing their first award or those who have committed their time to learn new skills to keep our section of the coast the safest there is.

Thank you to everyone who has been involved this year, and we look forward to bigger and better things for season 2022/2023.

JUNIOR DEVELOPMENT

2021/2022 was another great season for our junior members, with the Nipper and Youth programs completing a season jam-packed with Sunday morning activities, surf sports, education, water safety and social events.

Firstly, a huge heartfelt thank you to everyone who made the season so successful for our Youth members and Woodside Nippers. To all the parents, carers and members who gave their time to keep our young members safe, to instruct essential lifesaving skills, to motivate and coach our competitors and generally just help out whenever needed – thank you.

While we did have a slight decrease in Nipper numbers this season, our Youth program numbers (Under 14s to Under 19s) have increased, particularly in the 15 - 18 years age group.

- Nippers (5 – 13 years) – 189, down 7%
- Cadets (13 - 14 years) – 33, up 3%
- Youth (15 -18 years) – 27, up 35%

Our Age Group Managers give countless hours to our Nipper program in preparing and delivering fun and inclusive sessions that teach and reinforce essential lifesaving skills. Without their enthusiasm and commitment, the Nipper program would certainly not be as successful as it is.



We were also fortunate to have Jen White in the role of Water Safety Officer. Under her vigilant guidance our water safety team ensured all Nippers were safe and happy during Sunday morning activities. Jen was ably assisted by Water Safety Supervisors Tim Tucak, Terry Griffiths, Amanda Simper and Jo Turton along with a dedicated group of parents decked out in orange rashies, many of whom completed far more than their rostered Nipper 'Cygnet' water safety patrols.

The Nipper Rescue Certificate (NRC) is an essential award for any parent assisting with Nipper water safety. This season we had 28 parents requalify their existing award as well as 126 new qualifications gained. This award gives parents and carers of our Nipper members the opportunity to improve their own surf confidence and skills while qualifying them to join our Nipper water safety patrols.

Thank you to all parents, Senior members and Youth members who pulled on an orange vest or rashie to support our Age Group Managers by providing a valuable water safety service to our Nippers.



Nipper Administration Officer Lisa Engelbrecht ensured that all preliminary and competition evaluations were processed on time, and updated as required during the season, as well as closing out the season by finalising the participation certificates in SurfGuard.

We continued to benefit from the generous sponsorship of Woodside, with every Nipper once again receiving their own hi-vis vest, Nipper cap, wide brim hat and beach bag. This allocation of equipment has been welcomed by new members especially, kitting them out with everything they need to participate in the program.

We have also been fortunate to receive over 30 Nipper boards over the past few seasons, thanks to SLSWA sponsors Lotterywest and AGL. While these agreements have now ended, it was clear how much this additional equipment benefitted all Nippers. The funds provided by Woodside enabled the Club to purchase a further six hard boards at the beginning of the season, allowing older age groups to equip all Nippers with a suitable board during Sunday morning activities.

Thankfully, this season, our Nipper Club Champs were able to go ahead as planned, with the busy surf calendar meaning our Nippers competed across two weekends. This split format continues to prove successful - and far less stressful. All our Nippers should be so proud – everyone gave it their all and showed great sportsmanship across both mornings of competition. SurfFit (Logan Ovenden-Clarke), running training (Ray Lampard), swimming training (Anna-Lee Hazell), ski sessions (Amanda Simper, Luke Bishop, Peter Brigg), boards training (Peran Bishop, Amy Jackson, Sarah Caley), Paddlepops and iron training (Annie Juengling and Ben Juengling), surf boats (Kev White, Paul Lippiatt), and youth training (Alex Harrison, Kristie Orchard, Amanda Simper).

ON HOME GROUND

If there's one thing I learned as your rookie Surf Sports Manager this season, it's that Swanny members love home ground competition. Medals are great, but club bragging rights are the real prize.

Points Races competition was well attended throughout the season under the watchful eye of our Points Races Officer, Tim Tucak. The earlier 'sun smart' start time of 8am was trialled, to mixed reviews. Some of you love

getting up and on with the day, others enjoy a leisurely lie in before tackling the Shorebreak. Let's see where this ongoing debate lands us next season!

The Perpetual Trophy Cup events were hugely successful once again, and we had a great turn out for each of the Presidents' Cup 800m Long Swim, Oldham Memorial Cup 1200m Long Swim, F.E. Ford Cup 1600m Long Swim, Duncan McPhail Trophy 1500m Long Run and the Caris Cup Club Marathon Trophy.

This year's Ocean M Relay proved to be one of the most competitive and popular events on the intra-club surf sports calendar. The Williams, Lorenzen and Laws family pairing was ultimately victorious amongst a field of seven teams, narrowly edging out the Owens, Hutchinson, Lampard team and setting the stage for a rematch next season.



A highlight of the intra-club surf sports calendar was, once again, the Swanbourne Cup Mixed Board Rescue. A very impressive field of 23 teams put toes to the starting line. Three heats, two semi-finals and a close final later, the young guns Matilda and Clancy Banfield proved that they're the ones to beat with a hat-trick win.

This season Swanny also welcomed its first Dash-4-Cash event. Five events with cash prizes (kindly donated by SVN) for the most convincing sandbaggers across the line made for an incredibly fun day and some cashed up youth members. The handicappers will be sharpening their pencils in the off season, and we hope to bring you this event again in 2022/23.

The intra-club surf sports season concluded on a high note with our Youth and Open Club Championships, held over separate weekends. The Club Championships are a best-on-the-day competition, with winners determined by line honours. No handicaps – just skill, speed and more than a little bit of luck (especially at the Open Club Championships this year, where surf conditions were chaotic). It was great to see some new Bronzie faces in the mix, as well as several Youth members stepping up into open competition to teach the Seniors a thing or two (our Youth members Robbie Brigg and Jack Harrison have earned themselves a place on the Club Championship honour boards for their wins in the Open Male Beach Flags and Open Male Beach Sprint, respectively).

The surf sports results for the season are included at the end of this report. Thank you to Tim Tucak for recording and collating these results.

AWAY COMPETITION

Swanny kicked off the SLSWA surf sports season with impressive performances at the first key event on the calendar, the SunSmart WA Endurance Championships. Seven individual competitors and three surf boat teams pulled in four individual medals and two team medals earning Swanny an impressive seventh place overall.

More impressive results followed, with the Swanny team finishing sixth overall at the Summer of Surf carnival, with Swanny sisters Annie Juengling, Bernadette Williams and Miriam Williams showing the field how it's done by making a 1-2-3 clean sweep in the Open Female 2K Beach Run.

Settling into the season, Kung-Fu Swanny made its presence known at Country Carnival with 70 competitors pulling on a gi and taking the dojo to Back Beach in Bunbury, finishing up ninth in the overall points and best on ground with our unrivalled team spirit.

The SunSmart WA Masters Championships was a great day out for our young-at-heart Swanny competitors. We finished sixth of 18 clubs overall with only 13 competitors and brought home more than our fair share of the bling (much of it swinging from Lucy Gunzburg's neck) with 22 individual and four team championship medals.



The highlight of the SLSWA season is of course the SunSmart WA Surf Lifesaving Championships, and Swanny held its own amongst the State's elite youth and open competitors to finish 11th on 36 points with a gold medal (Open Female 2K Beach Run, Annie Juengling) and two silvers (Open Male Champion Lifesaver, Tim Tucak and Open Mixed First Aid, Tim Tucak and Paul Fox).

I must also acknowledge the very special surf sports achievement of Annie Juengling. With uncertainty around COVID-19 restrictions, SLSWA decided that it would not select Western Suns State teams for the 2021/22 season. Instead, a WA All Stars team was selected, recognising the achievements of our elite open athletes based on performances at the Surf Lifesaving Championships. Annie was one of only 11 individual athletes selected State-wide for her outstanding performance in the 2km Beach Run. This is an incredible personal achievement, and we are all incredibly proud that Annie represents the red and white cap at such an elite level.

There was naturally some disappointment to learn that the 2022 Aussies Surf Lifesaving Championships return to WA would be deferred until 2023. This didn't deter a small but fierce Swanny team from making the journey to the Gold Coast to represent the red and white cap and get us all fired up for Aussies in Perth next year. The Rampant Swans (Annie Juengling and Megan Stibbard) achieved an impressive fifth place in the Open Female 2 x 1Km Beach Relay.

And that's a wrap on season 2021/22! I will be handing over the surf sports reins next season, but I'm not going anywhere. You'll see me on the beach, pulling on the red and white cap and a country carnival costume, and taking over the stopwatch and clipboard from time to time. Over and out!

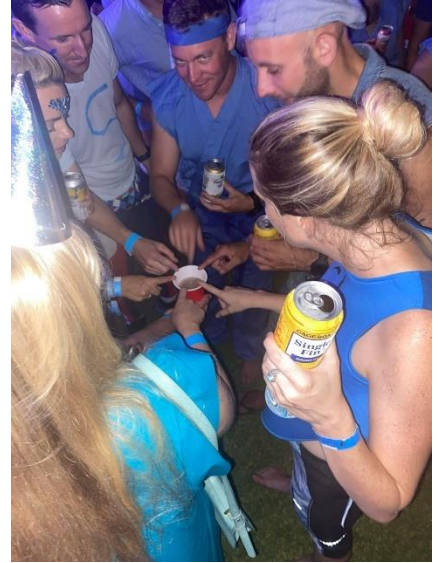

FINANCE AND ADMINISTRATION

Another season has flown by and now blends with the previous thirteen seasons in my memory bank. Julian is still training Bronzies, Tim's handicapping is still causing faux outrage and Leavo is still wearing his Superman rashie. This is Swanny!

For me the season highlight was our strong contingent of youth members. They're at boards, they're at skis, they're beating the seniors at Club Champs, they're taking over patrols and they're even at swimming training challenging Chris Hazell for the title of least amount of swimming and most amount of talking. The best thing is they're forming strong friendships and have been very much embraced by the senior members. There are some clear generations who have been the heart, soul, and engine room of Swanny, and this current crop of teenagers look to be our next major force.

From a Management Committee perspective, this season had one or two unusual challenges, none more time consuming and polarising than our COVID-19 response. State government mandates changed as fast as they were issued, SLSWA was reluctant to provide real direction, and everything was open for interpretation. It made for much debate before we landed on any course of action. There was positive and negative feedback received but ultimately, the Management Committee made decisions that we felt were in the best interests of the members because there is no blueprint for dealing with a pandemic. I think we'll all be relieved when we've seen the end of COVID-19 and we can get back to tackling the big issues like the theme for Country Carnival.

SUSTAINABILITY BY EMMA CHAFFEY

The fundamental relationship between Swanny and the coastline under our care compels us to consider our impact on the natural environment, as well as how climate change will impact Swanny in the coming decades. In 2021/2022 the Management Committee and members pursued several environmental initiatives.

Inefficient halogens lights were replaced with LEDs thanks to a donation of supplies and manpower from James Anderson. A new Smart Meter was also installed to assist in monitoring and optimising the Club's power consumption. An estimate of the Club's annual carbon footprint was also created to guide future environmental impact reduction initiatives.

Swanny continued its commitment to the Containers for Change program which saw a total of \$669 raised for Swanny as well as a positive contribution to improving our waste management. This figure represents collections from the Rampant Swan Bar as well as contributions by members and friends. Thank you to those who collected and deposited containers on behalf of Swanny this year.

It has become apparent that there is a need to upgrade the existing solar array to optimise the use of solar power for the Club’s energy needs. Should the Club elect to upgrade the solar system, additional funding will need to be sourced during the final stages of the building extension project. We look forward to further growth under the Sustainability Portfolio to ensure Swanny continues to have a positive impact on both the local community and the environment.

MEMBERSHIP

It wasn’t a record season for membership, but it wasn’t far off. This season Swanny membership totalled 733 members, a slight reduction on the previous season’s record 762 members. The reduction was primarily in the Nipper and Nipper Parent membership, with member numbers in these categories down a combined 8%.

What you don’t see in our membership numbers is our member turnover. In 2021/2022 Swanny welcomed 187 new members, but conversely, we lost over 200 members. Member retention will be an even greater challenge when Swanny becomes a construction site and access to our facilities is disrupted. Special shout out to President Luke Bishop. It's well documented so I'll keep it short and say I don't think any President in our history has achieved so much for us. Enjoy your short break, there's a building to build!

If I am lucky enough to go around again next season, I am looking forward to fresh perspectives and renewed enthusiasm. My first item on the agenda will be to let new managers know committee meetings only ever went for 30 minutes before they joined.

FINANCIAL PERFORMANCE

This season Swanny achieved an operating surplus of **\$440,616** however this result included \$300,000, the first tranche of the Lotterywest building grant. If we put aside the \$300,000 received, our surplus for "normal" club activities was **\$140,616**.

The above statement is 100% correct however due to the dark arts of accounting and capitalised costs, it's not an exact reflection of how normal people judge whether we are living within our means. To get a better understanding of our financial health, you should check our bank balance shown on the Balance Sheet.

As of 30 April 2022, Swanny had \$1,040,823 in the bank so we are all millionaires! Ignoring the \$300,000 grant mentioned above, Swanny has \$740,823 of its own cash, an increase in savings of **\$82,370** this season.

What makes this season's result outstanding is we have spent \$71,774 on engineering and design works for the new building, costs which are not normal lifesaving related costs, and which will be deducted from our commitment to the building extension. Our agreed contribution to the project is \$248,400 and our expenditure to-date totals \$82,373. These costs have been capitalised this season.

After the cancellation of the 2021 Ocean Classic, the Ocean Classic returned in a big way in 2022, delivering a monster profit of \$38,230. The reintroduction of the classic t-shirt was a hit, with all t-shirts selling out and in demand. Our industrious Merchandise Officer Natalie Owens even managed to off load a lot of merchandise from the last decade. Rumour has it even a Swanny tie was sold.

Aside from income and expenses associated with the building project, it was an uneventful and therefore conservative season from a financial perspective, with no major extra-ordinary costs or revenues across the portfolios. Total revenue was \$670,563, continuing the strong financial performance of recent seasons. Major revenue items in 2021-2022 are outlined below:

- Lotterywest Grant \$300,000
- Ocean Classic \$49,728
- City of Nedlands Grant \$46,374
- Membership Fees \$101,987
- Venue Hire \$28,757

Club costs totalled **\$210,626** (excluding depreciation and amortisation of \$19,321 which are non-cash costs). There was a further **\$71,774** spent on the building development design and specifications however these costs have been capitalised to become the bane of the Finance and Administration Manager for the next 20 years. That's accounting!

For a long time, our Nippers have not had the resources of other clubs and it's great to see that's steadily changing. Junior Development Portfolio costs in 2021-2022 were \$7,662, a 54% increase primarily due to the purchase of six new epoxy Nipper boards. We were also fortunate to be able to send five very worthy Youth members to the TOAD/Rise Up camps which Swanny fully funded for the first time.

In the Lifesaving Portfolio, the SLSA Beach Safety Equipment Fund (BSEF) was increased from \$5,000 to \$15,000 for 2021-2022 which is why our lifesaving expenses increased 100% to \$21,566. A condition of the BSEF grant is the money must be spent on approved lifesaving equipment within the season, so Lifesaving Manager Logan had a field day purchasing some very flash equipment to benefit our patrols. Swanny now has a Rescue Training Dummy for more realistic search and recovery simulations and a Bleed Trainer for trauma response education. An additional IRB engine was also purchased thanks to the BSEF grant.

Surf Sports costs were up 50%, with portfolio expenses totalling \$36,362. Minor cost increases across training and competition can simply be attributed to a return to relative normalcy, with carnival, coaching and pool lane hire costs increasing through attendance. Swanny also made a major purchase, ordering its first double ski in decades at cost of \$5,045. Due to the pandemic, Swanny is still waiting for delivery 12 months on however it is now scheduled to arrive in June. Year to be determined. Surf boat costs were also up to \$4,829 thanks mainly to a broken sweep oar and new helmets for the crew for when Lippo is sweeping.

In all other portfolios, income and expenditure was incredibly consistent and variances were generally due to out-of-ordinary events in the previous season. An example of this being the two Annual Dinners held last season due to COVID delays, which doubled associated costs and revenue in the Social portfolio in 2020/2021.

For the Club finances this season to be the equal of last, a season considered to be the strongest financial season in our history, it's a credit to the continued hard work of every portfolio. Thank you all for making Swanny our home away from home, it makes writing this report worthwhile.

Note 1 Statement of Significant Accounting Policies

This special purpose financial report was prepared for distribution to the members of Swanbourne Nedlands Surf Life Saving Club Inc. to fulfil the financial reporting requirements of the Management Committee under the Associations Incorporation Act (WA) 2015.

The accounting policies used in the preparation of this report, as described below are consistent with the financial reporting requirements of Swanbourne Nedlands Life Saving Club Inc. and are, in the opinion of the Management Committee, appropriate to meet the needs of its members.

The financial report has been prepared on an accruals basis and is based on historic costs and does not take into account changing money values, or except where specifically stated, current valuations of non-current assets, and has been prepared in accordance with Australian Accounting Standards.

Peppercorn Lease

Swanbourne Nedlands Surf Life Saving Club Inc. is dependent on a lease from the City of Nedlands that has significantly below-market terms and conditions principally to enable the Club to further its objectives. The nature and terms of the lease include:

- a) Lease payments of one peppercorn per annum payable on the Lessor's demand.
- b) For the Term 1 January 2014 to 31 December 2034.
- c) Applicable to Reserve 7804, Lot 403 on Deposited Plan 36773 being the whole of the land comprised within Crown Land Title Volume LR3136 Folio 90 and Lot 404 on Deposited Plan 36773 being the whole of the land comprised within Crown Land Title Volume LR3136 Folio 91 together with all buildings, structures, alterations, additions, and improvements on those portions of the Land or erected on those portions of the Land during the Term.
- d) For the purpose of lifesaving activities including the hire of the facilities for groups and individuals providing such hire is subject to the terms of the Lease.



Report on the Audit of the Financial Report

Opinion

VALE – PETER STANLEY GOLDTHORPE

29th January 1941 – 24th November 2021

It is with sadness that the Club informs you that Peter Goldthorpe passed away on 24th November 2021.

Peter joined the Club on as a Juvenile in the 1954/55 Season, gaining his Qualifying Certificate on 15th December 1956 and then his Bronze Medallion, WA 258 on 16th February 1957 with the Swanbourne Nedlands SLSC. Along with Peter, the balance of his Bronze Medallion squad included Ron Gadsby, Michael Bemrose, Eric Griffin, Bruce Stamp, Ian Stamp and Rob Kemp. Peter transferred to Cottesloe SLSC at the start of the 1961/62 season.

Most recently Peter was present at the Nipper Program supporting his daughter Davina, an Age Group Manager, and his grandchildren Stirling, Neve, Hadley and Amity. He was also a regular early morning beachgoer, riding his bicycle to the beach and fishing at Vera View beach, just south of Swanbourne Beach.

Peter was an outstanding swimmer and a successful competitor in Belt Races, Surf Races and Rescue and Resuscitation events. His competitive record at Swanbourne is listed on the following pages. During his last winter at the Club he began stroking the Reg Trigg surf boat. Peter Goldthorpe, Edwin Jaggard (sweep), Ian Barry, Len Bath and David Batt spent every Sunday afternoon of the winter rowing and cracking waves in Swanbourne's elderly double ended plank boat Reg Trigg, an ideal craft in which to learn the rudiments of boat handling.

Swanbourne's post-war swimming strength faded away until the late 1950s, when a further resurgence occurred.

Leading it was Peter Goldthorpe, whose older brother, John was at one time a member. Peter Goldthorpe or "Choppers", as he was later known, had come up through the Club from the Juveniles. Among his contemporaries were Bob Gray, Baxter Hook, Rod Hutton, Gary Fletcher and a number of others who gave the Club its greatest junior strength for many years. Peter Goldthorpe was swimming coach Jack Hughes' star pupil; before long several other Swanbourne Juniors were training with him too, so the Club's fortunes began to revive.

While a member of Swanbourne, (for he eventually transferred to Cottesloe) Peter Goldthorpe was far and away the Club's outstanding swimmer. He had an almost effortless slow stroke and could perform well in either calm or very rough conditions. As a Cadet and Junior he had an excellent record, climaxed by the Junior Belt Race Championship in 1959. However Peter's problem, and it was one which Bob Milne also had to face, was lack of competition within the Club. Colin Cook was now living in the country and making infrequent appearances, while Baxter Hook and Edwin Jaggard were never consistent enough to really push him, although the latter beat Peter for the Club Belt Race title in 1959, the year that he won the State Championship. Eventually in the 1961-62 season Peter Goldthorpe transferred to Cottesloe where he was to build up an outstanding competitive record as well as serving as Captain for many years. He is now a Life Member of that club.

11th March 1938 – 17th February 2022

It is with sadness that the Club informs you that Rob Vaisey passed away on 17th February 2022.

Rob joined the Club in the 1955/56 season, quickly gaining his Bronze Medallion, WA No. 128 on 4th December 1955 with the Swanbourne Nedlands SLSC. Along with Rob, the Bronze Medallion squad included Peter Butterworth, Graham Gillett and Graham Bardsley. Rob gained his Instructors Certificate in 1956/57 (equivalent of the Trainer Officers Certificate).

Rob served the Club as Vice Captain Patrol Officer (equivalent of the Lifesaving Manager today) for two seasons from 1957/58 to 1958/59. He was also one of the Delegates to State Centre in 1957/58 and 1958/59

Rob won the Oldham Memorial Cup in 1955/56 and the Presidents' Cup in 1957/58. He was Club Surf Race Champion and Club Belt Race Champion as a Junior (Under 18) in 1955/56. With Graham Gillet he was Club Double Ski Champion in 1958/59. They were also Silver Medallists at the State Championships in the Double Ski Race. Rob was the inaugural winner of the C W Court Trophy for the Club Champion Lifesaver in 1958/59.

Graham Gillett, Robin Vaisey, Kevin Kemp and Kevin Richards were the pioneer ski competitors of the period, enjoying most success in the double ski event.
